



We began the Autumn Term celebrating exceptional performances in the summer's GCSE and A Level examinations across the range of subjects with many pupils achieving a succession of top grades. There were also notable individual stories, such as those who have overcome significant challenges to achieve their wonderful results.





Over recent years the school gone from strength to strength, leading to a sustained improvement in standards and outcomes as well as hugely increased demand for places. Last year the school, which had already been described as one of the 'most improved in the country' by the Department for Education, received further external validation from Ofsted Inspectors who described the excellent education that is now being provided.

Year 11 pupil Liv earned an incredible 9 Grade 9s at GCSE. In addition to her grades, Liv received a certificate of commendation for her overall performance which places her amongst the highest performers in the country. She not only met the grade 9 criteria, but was comfortably over the grade threshold in all areas placing her in the top percentile of candidates nationally. She said: "I am absolutely thrilled with my results. I can't believe I have done so well. I am hoping to pursue a career in Medicine in the future so these grades will hopefully stand me in good stead. I'd like to thank all of my teachers for all of their hard work and support."

Year 13 student Eve said: "I really wasn't expecting to do as well as I have - I am actually shaking. I'm going to Sheffield University to study Landscape Architecture, which I am really excited about. I've chosen to study that as Geography is my favourite subject and it is closely linked. I'd like to thank all of my teachers for all of their hard work and particularly all of my Geography teachers over the years for helping me get an A^* "




Longcroft's Year 7 and Year 8 teams enjoyed victories over visitors Beverley High School in our first **girls' football** matches of this season.

The Government Communication Headquarters GCHQ is one of three UK intelligence and security agencies. They work alongside MI5 and SIS (also known as MI6). The agencies use cutting edge technology, ingenuity and wide-ranging partnerships to identify, analyse and disrupt threats to the UK. They work across several missions from counter-terrorism and serious crime, cyber security and support defence, through protecting the NHS and improving the nation's economic resilience. GCHQ, love creating puzzles and breaking codes. That's why every year they create the GCHQ Christmas Challenge, a series of fiendish brainteasers and puzzles, designed by a team of codebreakers. It encourages children aged 11-18 to think laterally and work as a team, as well as showcasing some of the skills they might need become a spy.



Mrs Low explained: "Each class worked under the supervision of a 'Chief Intelligence Officer' that monitored progress between the teams. It was their responsibility to swap agents across tasks where their mathematical skills would be best suited to complete the mission. As the agents were working against the clock, each time a team solved their puzzle, they were designate another puzzle to assist with. 30 agents, 7 tasks, 60 minutes...to save the world!"

Last Wednesday, newly published author David Ayre visited Longcroft Library to talk to Year 12 English Literature students about his debut novel Pegasus Rising. Students listened to an extract from the book and enjoyed lots of discussion and a lively Q & A.

How does David feel about becoming a published author??

"It doesn't seem real. It wasn't something I'd always set out to do. There are no authors in my family, but I've always loved writing."

Pegasus Rising has a dramatic, visually cinematic opening; lots of twists and turns in the plot, and is a gripping and tense thriller. It recalls the events of Bloody Sunday on 30th January 1972 and thrusts them once more into the ministerial arena.

British politics is in a mess; a massive explosion has occurred in central London that threatens to destabilize the whole of Great Britain; the fatalities are catastrophic.

Enter D.C.I. Harper, a female dynamo detective who is razor blade smart and full of integrity. Can she get to the truth, solve the crime?

One of the themes in the book concerns the treatment of soldiers after witnessing conflict. David joined the British Army himself straight out of school, serving in several locations, including Bosnia Herzegovina and Germany. His father was a British soldier too, and met his wife in

Germany, where David was born. Alissia asked if David found it hard to come to terms with aspects of his former career as a soldier:

"Yes, when I joined the army I was just 17. I was following the family tradition. I was young and cocky; I wasn't thinking about the effect it would have on me in the future. When I came out, I was a different person. I didn't suffer PTSD, but aspects of my military career shaped the person I am today."

One of the main characters in the novel has had a successful army career until PTSD impacts and things spiral out of control. Miss Meek wanted to know if it was hard making the transition back to ordinary life when leaving the services and Megan asked if was important to represent PTSD in the novel:

"Yes, it's true that those who are looking to leave the army or have left feel they're frequently not getting the support they need from the government. In the army everything is done for you; when you leave you're on your own, and it's "thank you for your help and off you go". When I left I had to quickly find a job. I lived from month to month, working on contracts until I got a

permanent job and things became secure.

There are some short-term schemes to help soldiers, but no long-term support; especially for those with mental health issues like PTSD."

What inspired David to write a political thriller?

"I began writing it in lockdown and at the time there was a lot in the news about ex-paratroopers who had served in Northern Ireland and decades later were to go on trial. That enraged me. The thought that people who were following orders, doing their job, were being persecuted."

The character of Gillian, the female detective, operates in in a very male dominated environment. Ellie asked how successful David felt she is in that world.

"Very. She's appreciated by her peers and superiors. Her life is minimalist; she's not got a partner. She's totally dedicated, and her world is her job."

Lydia asked what type of books David likes to read. Has he any favourite authors?

"I'm not a massive reader, not like my wife, but I love a mystery, thrillers and crime fiction. I really like Dan Brown's Da Vinci Code, and Tom Clancy is a great author too. My favourite book is Clive Cussler's Sahara."

How have David's family responded to his novel?

"My younger son, who attends Longcroft, says he's enjoying reading it! James, my eldest, who was in the Sixth Form at Longcroft, and is now at Hull University has been a great help promoting the book through social media, and my wife really encouraged me to find a publisher. In fact, if it wasn't for her I might just have left the book in a drawer. She was very motivating."

Was it hard to find a publisher?

"Not really, but I used a hybrid publisher."

Under the hybrid system the author shares the costs of publishing and distributing a novel, so the publisher takes less risk. It combines elements of traditional and selfpublishing.

"I forwarded the first three chapters to about six publishers, and within a couple of weeks I had some positive responses."

Mrs Clarke wanted to know how involved the publishers were with the editing stage of the novel:

"They did quite a lot of proof reading and editing, especially my bad spelling! It took some time to correct the mistakes, and the manuscript went back and forth. Eventually, I thought I'd made all the changes I could."

Ellie asked how David arrived at the title of the book.

"Actually I didn't have a title until I'd finished writing the book. It came to me right at the end. You'll understand what I mean when you read the final page."

Miss Meek inquired if David had plans for any more books.

"A few people have asked for a sequel or prequel. I'd love to give it a go."

It could be that Pegasus Rising will be the first of many books written by David. If you like crime fiction with a political flavour, then this it is a great book choice for you.

A huge thank you to David from all our English A Level students, their teacher Miss Meek, and the Library team. It was a fabulous visit and really informative.
