Headteacher's Welcome

In the week of the spring equinox, the sun has been shining and our stunning estate has been a site to behold as it slowly wakes from the winter slumber. Even as daylight has fallen at the end of busy days, packed full of activities across the school, we have been presented with some wonderful sunsets to enjoy.

British Science Week has provided a range of experiences for our children last week and you can read about some of the exciting things our children have been doing in this week's Newsletter. There has been lots going on as ever, including assemblies this week planned and led by our pupils in the St John's Ambulance cadets, considering CPR and our new cohort of Forest Schoolers enjoying the weather and making the most of our natural environment.

With the exam season looming, we took Year 11 pupils to Hull University for our 2025 Longcroft Revision and Study Skills Conference on Friday. Now well established, it was another amazing event and our pupils represented themselves and the school exceptionally well. We explored research informed



revision strategies and gave pupils the opportunity to experience various seminars as well as time to rehearse what they had learned with support from specialist staff from across the curriculum. Hearing pupils reflect on their future plans and articulate their commitment to realising their ambitions was hugely encouraging and we are with them every step of the way! For many of our children, this was the first experience of a professional conference environment and the event is therefore also an opportunity to develop social and cultural capital. Ensuring our young people feel comfortable in a range of environments and with different experiences is a key aspect of our work to prepare them well for life beyond school. Thank you to Hull University for supporting our conference and making us all feel so welcome.

The conference also provided the opportunity to launch an exciting new suite of programmes that we are launching through our East Yorkshire Sixth Form. Through an innovative partnership with Bishop Burton College alongside our existing regional school partners, we are creating new 'Post 16 Pathways' in Health, Uniform/Public Services, Sport, Leisure & Tourism and Land Based studies. You can read more about this development in Mr Chapman's Sixth Form article and we have written to Year 11 parents with further details. Having listened to pupils about their post 16 preferences we liaised with leading employers and education providers in the region to create programmes that enable a blend of existing A-Level and new vocational courses, as well as provide meaningful engagements with professionals and employers. We are hugely excited about this partnership and extension to our offer and anticipate a high level of demand in the locality. We are therefore offering our own pupils the first opportunity to express an interest and will share further details in due course.



Our 'attendance challenge' continues to be a focus for the school and what a great reaction we've enjoyed so far. Next week we also see hundreds of our pupils enjoy rewards for achieving their 50 day streak since they 'jumped in to January' at the start of the year. A huge well done to all! As a community we are all aware how important attendance is to a successful education, so it is great to be in a strong position currently compared to schools nationally. There is still much work to do and we will maintain a strong focus on attendance across the summer term. Thank you in anticipation for your continued support in ensuring children are in school, learning and enjoying the array of experiences on offer.

Mrs Newsam said: "Sasha has been working really hard and enjoyed the competition. I'm very proud of her and love to see how happy it makes her!"








Which is a lie? Mr Worthington



- I was part of a small research beam that contributed towards the analysis of Cow Magnetism. Looking at satellite images of the bovine species, we were looking at alignment and pattern analysis, contributing to a national database.
- I was invited as a guest to Hull University to lecture second and third year students about careers in Physics
- At University, my main specialism was optical physics; working with lasers and developing mathematical constructs for mapping a molecular analysis technique known as Surface Plasmon Resonance

Which is a lie? Answers





- True I was part of a Hull Alumni science committee, and part of my role was to talk to undergraduates about their options after University and my experiences
- True I did some modelling using a sophisticated program called Mathematica, looking at the Otto Configuration and Kretschmann Configuration of firing light with wavelengths of 632nm at metal film, a bechnique used in biomolecular analysis



During the last week our Year 7 pupils have been diving into the exciting world of science in celebration of British Science Week, which runs annually to inspire pupils and communities across the UK. The theme for British Science Week 2025, 'Science in the Natural World,' has provided an excellent opportunity for our Year 7 pupils to explore the wonders of the environment, biodiversity, and the intricate connections between science and nature. Indeed, Mrs Scott, our Head of Science presented to all pupils in Key Stage 3 during a recent assembly about the topic, discussing the impact humans can have on the biosphere. Pupils explored the role of ecosystems and the delicate balance needed to maintain them. Pupils were able to understand how different species interact with their environment and the impact humans have on the natural world. This gave them a deeper appreciation of how science and nature are inextricably linked, while also fostering a sense of responsibility for protecting our planet.

Throughout the week, our pupils have engaged in a range of hands-on activities designed to spark curiosity and deepen their understanding of the world around them. In science lessons, they have worked on experiments and projects that highlight how science can be used to solve real-world problems in conservation, climate change, and sustainable living.

Additionally, Year 7 pupils were challenged to use their creativity and problem-solving skills to design eco-friendly inventions, such as sustainable energy solutions and recycling systems, which they presented to their classmates. These activities not only tied into the theme of the week but also encouraged teamwork, critical thinking, and a hands-on approach to scientific discovery.

The enthusiasm shown by our Year 7 pupils throughout British Science Week 2025 has been truly inspiring. It's clear that the next generation of scientists is filled with curiosity and passion for the natural world. We are proud of their achievements and look forward to seeing how they continue to engage with the world of science in the future.

The pupils have been reflecting on the experts that they have in front of them delivering Science lessons week-in week-out; last week's Pupil Bulletin included a "two truths and a lie" feature about our Science staff. I had the pleasure of visiting Hull University recently for continuous professional development, getting my teeth into some degree level ferromagnetism and

particle physics. It was a pleasant surprise to bump into an former student I taught who is now a teacher herself!

A huge thank you to all our pupils and staff who contributed to making this week a success. Let's keep the momentum going as we continue to explore the fascinating world of science together.

CAREER OF THE WEEK: Visual Merchandiser

What does a visual merchandiser do?

A visual merchandiser is responsible for creating visually appealing displays and layouts to attract customers and promote sales in retail stores or other commercial settings. They play a crucial role in driving sales and creating a positive shopping experience by effectively showcasing products and enticing customers to make purchases.



The main duties of a visual merchandiser include, designing and setting up displays of products in store windows, on shelves, or in other prominent areas to capture customers' attention; planning and arranging the layout of merchandise within the store to enhance the overall shopping experience; selecting and placing products strategically to maximize visibility and sales potential, often based on factors like seasonality, trends, and promotional campaigns; using decor elements, props, signage, and lighting to enhance the visual appeal of displays and create a cohesive brand image; keeping up-to-date on current trends in design, fashion, and retail to ensure that displays are relevant and engaging to the target audience; working closely with store managers, buyers, and marketing teams to align visual merchandising strategies with overall business objectives and marketing campaigns; and regularly refreshing displays and making adjustments to ensure that they remain visually appealing and reflective of the brand's image.

What can I expect to earn as a visual merchandiser?

As a guide, the starting salary for a visual merchandiser is typically between £18,000 and £22,000 per annum. With experience, this is likely to increase to between £24,000 and £30,000 per annum. An experienced senior visual merchandiser can earn over £40,000 per annum. They may also receive benefits such as a company car, mobile phone, and a bonus.

What subjects should I study to become a visual merchandiser?

Useful subjects to become a visual merchandiser include art and design, also important are maths and English. Other beneficial subjects include fashion design, textiles, and other creative subjects.

How can I start my career as a visual merchandiser?

There are several ways to become a visual merchandiser. You could undertake a college course in fashion, retail, or merchandising, and then apply for employment as a visual merchandiser with a retail business. You could complete a visual merchandising apprenticeship, earning a salary whilst you learn. You could also complete a foundation degree or degree in a subject like visual merchandising or fashion buying and merchandising, and then apply for employment.

If you are already working in retail, you could ask to take on responsibility for some visual merchandising duties with your current employer. You could also apply directly to other visual merchandising jobs.

Post 16 Pathways at The East Yorkshire Sixth Form | Incredible Opportunity

To further extend our course offer, we have established a new suite of pathways for students to explore. These pathways will not only enable our students to blend existing A-Levels with complementary vocational courses, but will also provide a wider programme of enrichment that will be unparalleled in the region. Pupils will have access to meaningful engagements with relevant professionals and employers alongside their taught curriculum to appreciate the applications of their learning in the work place and ensure their readiness for future opportunities.

At this stage we are gathering interest in the pathways available through phase one, starting in September 2025. We are launching the offer with Year 11 pupils, asking for them to complete a short survey to aid planning, and wanted to share the news with parents so that you can discuss the opportunities at home.







Phase one pathways include:

Health | Public Services | Sport | Leisure/Tourism | Land/Environment

We have been able to create these pathways through an innovative partnership with Bishop Burton College. Our aim is to develop in our students the skills and experience that will provide access to great employment opportunities, opening doors to jobs, further education and training within the region. In addition to all of the benefits students currently enjoy from our East Yorkshire Sixth Form, they will also have access to the Bishop Burton facilities as well as expert teaching from their 'Outstanding' vocational delivery team.

Each pathway will include a relevant BTEC National (Level 3) Extended Certificate qualification, delivered by our partners at Bishop Burton using their specialist on site facilities one day per week. The remainder of the taught curriculum will be delivered in school and students will retain their choice of complementary courses from the wide range already available.

We anticipate a high level of demand for these leading-edge programmes and are therefore offering the first opportunity to express an interest to our Longcroft pupils and partnership schools.

This is a hugely exciting development and we welcome your input in helping us to shape our offer around our children and the opportunities for great jobs and secure futures in the region. 

"You answered the questions very well."



The Yoto Carnegie Books 2025 Have Arrived

The Yoto Carnegie Awards are one of the most important events in the literacy calendar. A time to fully appreciate what amazing books are being written for children and teenagers, and take pleasure in reading them



This year 119 books were nominated, 55 books for the Carnegie Medal for Illustration, which celebrates an outstanding reading experience through illustration and is generally aimed at primary school readers, and 64 books for the Carnegie Medal for Writing, awarded to a book written in English that ignites an exceptional reading experience in secondary school readers.

The Carnegies, organised by CILIP, the library and information association, are the UK's longest running and best-loved book awards for children and young people, and are unique for being judged solely by librarians.

In February the 119 books were whittled down to a longlist, featuring 19 books in the writing section, which last week became a shortlist of just 8 books. The longlist novels are now on display in the Library, and this week and next you'll find some short reviews about each one. Not surprisingly, there are some incredible reads to sample: books that have huge impact and develop empathy skills, cover contemporary issues, and are inclusive. Please do encourage your children to read them.



The Glasgow Boys by Margaret McDonald – Reading Age 14+ AR Book Level – Blue

This debut novel about two boys who meet when they are placed in care is simply superb. It's one of those truly special books that moves you, changes you, teaches you. A book that you know you'll never forget and will read again.

It's hard to imagine the trauma, fear, and loneliness Finlay and Banjo grapple with on a daily basis, how it feels to be in a world where you have no safety net and are completely alone, or the impact a hug can have on one starved of affection.

For a time the two boys are incredibly close, but then something happens between them. Will they ever be reconciled? Will they have the courage to embrace life, have faith, hope?

Contains mild sexual situations, self-harm, substance abuse, violence, profanity.


Us In The Before And After by Jenny Valentine – Reading Age 13+ AR Book Level - Blue

Elk and Mab have just completed their school exams. They are 16, and it's the summer holidays; they should have their whole lives ahead of them.

This sensitive, touching, beautifully written novel is about an inseparable friendship. When a tragic accident occurs they are not willing to let that friendship die, and through their ghostly conversations we learn how they met, all about their families, their dreams and what led the accident to occur.

A book with an amazing twist. A compelling must read.





Louder Than Hunger by John Schu – Reading Age 12+ AR Book Level – Green

It's hard being a teenager; especially when you're different. People don't always appreciate difference. Moreover, the negative voices in Jake's head keep telling him he's repulsive, worthless; he should just stop eating, and disappear.

Set in the USA, this heart-wrenching book, written in powerful verse, is a fictionalised account of its author's own teenage experience of dealing with anorexia nervosa and time spent in residential clinics for eating disorders.

A compelling read. I defy anyone, even those who have never met anybody dealing with an eating disorder, not to gain understanding and insight from this book. Raw, honest and authentic. However dark the times, this is a book about self-empowerment, courage and hope. Brilliant.



Sisters of the Moon by Marie-Louise Fitzpatrick – Reading Age 13+ No AR

Suzy's Mum has died, all laughter has gone, and grief surrounds her. One night, lit by a supermoon, Suzy goes into the garden, longing for everything to change. Suddenly it does.

Enter courageous new girl Rhiannon, who becomes Suzy's best friend, and makes everything happen. It seems that life is eventually beginning to improve.

But who is Rhiannon, why does she never have any things with her, and why hasn't Suzy visited her home?

A mystical tale about the power of female friendship. Wonderfully ethereal and awash with atmosphere.

The Final Year by Matt Goodfellow – Reading Age 10-11+ AR Colour Code – Red


This powerful verse novel, illustrated by Joe Todd-Stanton, is a great book to read aloud. It's the last year of primary school and Nate is getting ready for high school, and lots of change. Of course, it's all a bit daunting, but with his best mate, PS, beside him, Nate has no fears.

But when the two friends, who have been inseparable since kindergarten, are put in different classes things change. PS has a new friend, and not just any friend but the school bully. When Nate's youngest brother, Dylan, is rushed to hospital matters get even worse.

How can Nate process all this pain? Perhaps his new teacher, Mr Joshua, will help Nate find his way.

A touching story about the importance of reading and writing, and finding those who really matter in your world.






King of Nothing by Nathanael Lessore – Reading Age 11+ AR Colour Code – Blue

Anton is known as the bad boy at his South London secondary school; the King of Year 9. His dad is in prison, and he's feared and respected. Matthew is known as the biggest loser in school, but when he unexpectedly saves Anton's life, an unexpected friendship is sparked.

Identity, class, family relationships, teenage angst, first love, and what it means to be a man are all explored in this humorous but deep read.

Some violence, gender bias, criminal activity, bullying, and mild profanity.



Play by Luke Palmer – Reading Age 13+ AR Colour Code – Red

Mark, Matt, Johnny and Luc have been friends forever. They are different, but they've shared so much, and have played so many games But things shift when Mark begins running errands for someone his older brother knows, and he starts thinking he's found the greatest game of all.

This hard-hitting novel is all about making choices, and what happens when we make the wrong ones. Themes include boyhood, modern day masculinity, and loss of innocence.


The dialogue is authentic, and the short chapters and straightforward language add to the pace. There is some reference to drugs, trafficking, homophobia, misogyny, toxic masculinity, implied sexual assault, death and neglect. A serious read.

You Could Be So Pretty by Holly Bourne – Reading Age 14+ AR Colour Code – Blue

This compelling dystopian YA novel, by feminist author Holly Bourne, combines elements of Atwood's The Handmaid's Tale with Scott Westerfeld's Uglies.

In the world Belle and Joni inhabit girls have just two choices: to follow the Doctrine, wear a mask, put up with sexual misconduct, misogyny and be crowned at the Ceremony as a Pretty, or to be an Objectionable, leave your face bare, and strive to escape to the Education.

Bourne's novel may be dystopian or speculative, but it's not all fiction. We live in a society in which some young girls are afraid to leave their homes without make-up on, feel pressurised to have the perfect face, and constantly check the faces of others on their phones. It's a world where toxic masculinity is on the increase.



But maybe there is a third option... If Belle and Joni work together, they may destroy the rules and set themselves free. An inspiring book every young girl should read.

"Reading fiction is important. It is a vital means of imagining a life other than our own, which in turn makes us more empathetic beings. Following complex story lines stretches our brains beyond the 140 characters of soundbite thinking, and staying within the world of a novel gives us the ability to be quiet and alone, two skills that are disappearing faster than the polar icecaps."

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
